PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

PROTECTIVE BEHAVIOURS

The incident with the jogger who ran past our school and called out to the children has prompted further discussions among the children about strangers approaching the school fence. The children have had opportunities to discuss these situations with their teachers, Kenny Koala earlier in the term and myself. This is a good opportunity to share some of the messages you might be able to reinforce with your child at home:

- Everyone has the right to feel safe
- If an adult outside the school comes to talk at the fence, don't engage with them, run to a teacher and tell them straight away
- Discuss the people who are part of your child's safety network and the people who can help them at times when they feel unsafe
- Discuss different safe and unsafe scenarios and how your child might respond
- If an unsafe situation occurs, ensure your child knows that they only report the facts of the situation.

If you have specific language or scripts that you talk about at home, please let your child's teacher know so they can be incorporated in the discussion. As this is a topic of concern for families, we will organise another Protective Behaviours session for families early next term.

WRITING AT HOME – INFORMATION SESSION

Tips for supporting young writers

- Drawing is one of the first ways that children convey their message and should be encouraged and valued.
- Work together with your child on a collaborative piece where they draw and you scribe. Share your ideas and acknowledge theirs. This is the beginning of the development of oral storytelling skills, which is an essential stage in the development of writing.

Tools that encourage early writing:

- Pencils
- Textas
- Chalk
- Sticks
- Paint
- Crayons

You can assist your child to develop their hand strength and dexterity by providing opportunities to engage in the following activities:

- Paint- using a range of tools including fingers, brushes, rollers, stamps, cotton buds, straws, tooth picks.
- Draw- using crayons, pencils, markers, pens, chalk and on surfaces such as paper, cardboard, windows, in sand, in shaving cream, in paint.
- Cut with scissors
- Manipulate play-dough, clay and putty
- Play Board games and jigsaw puzzles
- Engage in sandpit play
- Use squeeze balls
- Pick up objects using tweezers
- Sewing and threading.

Most importantly:

Embrace and celebrate your child's attempts to make meaning in the form that they choose. They will continue to develop as writers when their efforts are celebrated by the people they value and admire most.
